 - Financial Aid Grants to students under Section 18004(a) (1) of the CARES act is 32.
- **5.** As of September 18, 2020, the total number of students who have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act is 19.
- **6.** The method used by EWHAI School to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants was the Following:

Determine Eligible Students:

- Must be enrolled in a EWHAI Program on 03/17/20 when Campus closed due to COVID-19.
- Must be eligible for Federal Student aid and have a FAFSA on file.
- Currently enrolled students must be making satisfactory Academic Progress.
- Must return the HEERF application sent to them.

Determining How Much:

- Created list of students that submitted Application requesting HEERF Emergency Financial Aid, with corresponding EFC.
- Eighteen students with EFC equal to or less than \$36,620 received \$375, and one student with an EFC of \$927,928 received \$247.

Dear EWHAI Student,

East West Healing Arts Institute has received a small grant allocation from the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) under Section 18004(a)(1) of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Securities (CARES) Act. A portion of the HEERF funds received is to be used as emergency financial aid grants to eligible students for expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to coronavirus (including eligible expenses under a student's cost of attendance such as food, housing, course materials, technology, health care, and child care).

Application Deadline is Monday, August 17th, 2020.

EWHAI is committed to disburse the HEERF emergency financial aid grant monies to eligible students quickly, so time is of the essence.
